It takes dedication to work for the same employer your entire life and that is what Carol Hoehn has done at PCH. In 1978, while Carol Hoehn was a junior at Pana High School, her teacher Ruth Berns told her the hospital was looking for a part-time typist. Carol applied for the job and began her career at PCH typing manuals for the hospital's first Joint Commission Accreditation. Upon graduation in 1979, she accepted a full-time position in the billing department. "I have never had any other employment!" stated Hoehn.

In 1994, Carol became Manager of the Business Office and remains in that position today. She manages 13 employees and oversees registration and patient accounts at the hospital. Carol has been at PCH since the very first computer system arrived in 1983 and has been a part of at least four computer system conversions. What major changes has Carol seen? "Payer reimbursement has become much more complicated due to an increase in government regulations and constantly changing technology," stated Hoehn.

After working at PCH more than 40 years, Carol stated she has had the privilege to work with many great people. "My most precious memories are of all the people and doctors I have worked with." In 2014, Carol really enjoyed seeing former CEO, Don Shula, return to PCH to celebrate the hospital's 100 year anniversary. "Don was the first CEO I worked under and I truly enjoyed getting the chance to see him and talk about the old days." So why would you stay in the same job your whole life? Carol's answer; "PCH has always been family oriented with an understanding that women with kids have to work. PCH provided flexibility I needed to raise my family. Still today, as a grandmother, PCH offers a balance of work and family."

In Memoriam

Remembering Dr. Virgilio M. Dycoco


Pana Community Hospital, Pana Medical Group, Quad County and Community Medical Clinic staff had to say goodbye to a dear friend and colleague—
Dr. Virgil Dycoco, on December 27, 2018. He was 78 years old. It was a difficult time for his family but also a very hard time for clinic and hospital staff who were his family as well. Dr. Virgil served Pana and surrounding communities for 45 years.

He was born in the Philippines to Leopoldo and Maria (Madrid) Dycoco and was one of 15 children. After graduating from Far Eastern University Institute of Medicine in the Philippines, he came to America to continue his internship and medical residency program at the New Jersey College of Medicine Hospital affiliates. Although he could have chosen to work in a larger city, in 1973 Dr. Virgil chose to come to Pana. He married Dr. Gloria in 1970 in New Jersey and together they practiced medicine at the Pana Medical Group and raised three children in Pana-Jun-Jun, Maria and Melissa. He was devoted to his wife, children and four grandchildren.

Dr. Virgil was an incredible physician but also liked to make work fun. Pana Medi-

cal Group staff has many fond memories of Dr. Virgil. One of those memories was of Dr. Virgil ringing a bell at the nurses to 'hurry up' and going to the waiting room to get patients himself if they were too slow. Other fond memories were Dr. Virgil's famous home-made egg rolls for staff at Christmas and singing karaoke at holiday parties.

According to those who worked right alongside Dr. Virgil, the thing that stood out most was his devotion to his patients. "He was the kind of doctor who called his patients in the evening to see how they were," stated Phyllis Schultz of PMG. Other staff said Dr. Virgil could remember everything about his patients. As he arrived to the office, he asked about medication refills or lab results on each patient without even looking at their chart. He loved his patients so much that he disliked being away from the office for too long. Shawn Holland of PMG recalls, "He would call the office while on vacation to check on his patients." After seeing patients Dr. Virgil's quote was "See how you do and let me know." He always wanted to know how each patient was doing. Even from his hospital room in his final days, Dr. Virgil was inquiring about his patients.



September 22, 1940 ~ December 27, 2018

In his last days, Dr. Virgil asked the nursing staff to take him up to the third floor for a visit with staff. He gave final words of inspiration, instructing staff to "do good for others" and offered words of reassurance about passing on to the next life. He even joked and made staff laugh one last time. As the nurses took him away, he said "I will see you again someday." We are very blessed to have had this man serve our hospital and community. We will miss his voice in these hallways and in the rooms at Pana Medical Group and look forward to the day when we will meet Dr. Virgil again!

Phase One

Services Begin in the New Addition!

It has been an exciting year at Pana Community Hospital as we have watched Phase I of our building project completed. Construction of Phase I of the building project was completed in January of 2019. The Illinois Department of Public Health inspected the building and in February sent the official "Certificate of Occupancy" which allowed the staff to move into their brand new space!




Above: The new Patient Services Addition includes a state of the art surgical suite with two operating rooms, eight recovery areas and a dedicated waiting room.

The addition also includes a new cafeteria and kitchen, creating a large dining space as well as cooking and prep areas. Hospital employees, patients and their families, and the general public will have access to the new cafeteria. The addition also includes a new area for materials management, space for a future in-house MRI and a large mechanical penthouse with all new equipment to serve the entire hospital.

This is the most significant building project and expansion that the hospital has undertaken in the past 50 years. It is absolutely necessary in order to provide for continued success and quality of services well into the future. As one of the largest employers in our community this project is vital to all of our citizens and to the citizens in the surrounding communities. We are fortunate that we continue to have a community-owned facility—something that many of our surrounding towns can no longer claim.



Phase Two



Construction crews have started Phase II of the project. The front entrance of Pana Community Hospital was closed in March as crews took down the front canopy and started digging the foundation. Phase II includes a new front drive in which patients will be able to easily access the building under a new canopy. As patients enter the hospital there will be a beautifully expanded waiting area

that features a two-story glass atrium and four private registration offices.

Phase II also includes an Urgent Care facility which will be added to the front of the current Emergency Department. The benefit of this location is that if an urgent care visit such as back pain becomes an emergency such as a heart attack, emergency staff are just a few feet away to handle any issues that may arise.

Due to the front entrance closure, patients are using a temporary entrance located at the back of the building. Emergency walk-in patients enter at the ambulance doors. Clinic patients enter the Medical Mall through the east doors located near the MRI. Volunteers are located at the temporary entrance to assist patients and visitors and escort them to where they need to go within the hospital during the construction process.

Other renovations in the hospital during Phase II include moving medical records and billing offices from the first floor to the third floor, new restrooms outside the new cafeteria, and extra storage space.

Phase II of the project is expected to be completed in the late fall of 2019. Plans are being made for a ribbon cutting ceremony and open house to celebrate the completion of the project.

Putting Patients

Pana Community Hospital In Process of Implementing New EMR System

Most of you know that Pana Community Hospital has embarked on a historical building project, but most do not know that we have begun a second major project at our hospital. In July 2018, we received board approval to convert our Electronic Medical Record (EMR) from our current system to Cerner Community Works. Our current system was being sold to several different companies creating unexpected extra expenses and an overall system that was not meeting standards.

The Cerner electronic medical record (EMR) is an integrated database that provides a comprehensive set of capabilities that allow healthcare professionals to electronically store, capture, and access patient health information in both the acute and ambulatory care settings. The hospital board and administration decided to convert to Cerner Community Works for many reasons, including cost savings, more reliable system, and most importantly, better quality of care for our patients. Advantages for patients include one single patient record that can be shared by our hospital and both Community Medical Clinic and Pana Medical group and online patient bill pay. It will also be easier for PCH to share patient records beyond our walls to larger hospitals in the area. Recent government regulations are requiring hospitals to be subject to a value based payment system. Cerner will help Pana Community Hospital and our clinics be prepared to meet these new government standards.

Pana Community Hospital and our governing Board of Directors makes sure that every decision we make improves the quality of care for the patients we serve—whether it is to upgrade our EMR system, purchase new hospital equipment, or even expand our entire physical building—we put patients first.
